All Psychological Associates are eligible to nominate and vote for the ex-officio Psychological Associate position. Over the past two years, the College has been reviewing and updating its by-laws and policies. Most of the by-laws required only minor changes. In some cases, wording was revised to enhance clarity and some by-laws, which per-

tained to related topics, were merged into a single by-law. According to the Health Professions Procedural Code of the Regulated Health Professions Act, 1991 [ss. 94. (2)], certain by-laws or amendments to certain by-laws require circulation to the membership at least 60 days before final approval by Council.

Members wishing to provide comments regarding any of these by-law amendments are encouraged to do so by e-mail (bylaws@cpo.on.ca), however submissions will be accepted by fax (416-961-2635), or by regular mail. Responses should be received no later than by Friday, March 13, 2009 to ensure they are available for inclusion in the information provided to Council when this matter is further considered.

Once all of the by-laws have been reviewed and approved, the complete set will be available on the College website.

A copy of each by-law, with the proposed amendments and an annotation describing the reason for the change, is published in this issue of the <u>Bulletin</u>. Changes are noted as follows; <u>blue/underlined are insertions</u> and <u>red/strikeouts are deletions</u>.

So...we are working on it. Just thought we'd let you know. There are a number of different ways we can go about this - there are lots of journals, lots of providers, and lots of problems sorting this out. Journals are not the 'be all' of continuing education, but they are an essential part. Stay tuned

By-laws Consultation

BY-LAW 18: FEES

[Approved by Council December 1999; amended March 2001; amended February 2002; amended March 2003; amended March 2004; September 2005]

This by-law is made under the authority of the Regulated Health Professions Act, 1991 as amended 1993, 1996 and 1998, subsections 94(1) (d.1), (d.2) and (d.3) and the Psychology Act, 1991 as amended. 1998

Heading added for clarity

Membership

- 18.1 Every member shall pay an annual membership fee in accordance with this bylaw for each membership year.
- 18.2 A membership year begins on June 1 in one year and ends on May 31 of the following year.
- 18.3 The annual fee for membership must be paid on or before June 1 in the membership year.
- 18.4 The annual fee for membership is,
 - (a) \$795 for members who hold a certificate of registration for regular status;
 - (b) \$238.50 for members who hold a certificate of registration for inactive status:
 - (c) \$50 for members who hold a certificate of registration for retired status; and
 - (d) \$397.50 for members who hold a certificate of registration for academic status.
- 18.5 No later than 30 days before an annual fee is due, the Registrar shall notify the member of the amount of the fee and the day on which the fee is due.
- 18.6 A member who fails to pay an annual fee on or before the day on which it is due shall pay a penalty of 10 per cent of the annual fee, in addition to the annual fee.

Quality Assurance Program Fees

- 18.7 A reminder fee of \$25.00 shall be paid by any member who is sent a third reminder letter notifying them member of their failure to complete the mandatory Declaration of Completion related to the Self Assessment Guide and Professional Development Plan.

- 18.8 The fee for the Examination for Professional Practice in Psychology is the fee set by the Association of State and Provincial Psychology Boards and its contractors.

- 18.9 The fee for the Jurisprudence and Ethics Examination is \$270.
- 18.10 The fee for the oral examination is \$740.



Interviews Fees

18.11 The fee for an interview is \$740.

Applications

- 18.12 The fee for an application for Supervised Practice is \$230.
- 18.13 The fee for an application for Interim Autonomous Practice is \$100.
- 18.14 The fee for an application for an Autonomous Practice Psychological Associate applying for Supervised Practice as a Psychologist is \$100.

Professional Corporation

- 18.15. The fee for the application for, and issuance of, a certificate of authorization, including any reinstatement of a certificate of authorization, for a professional corporation is \$500.
- 18.16 The fee for the annual renewal of a certificate of authorization is \$350.
- 18.17 A professional corporation or a member listed in the College's records as a shareholder of a professional corporation shall pay an administrative fee of \$50 for each notice sent by the Registrar to the corporation or member for failure of the corporation to renew its certificate of authorization on time. The fee is due within 30 days of the notice being sent.
- 18.18 The fee for the issuing of a document or certificate respecting a professional corporation, other than the first certificate of authorization or the annual renewal of a certificate of authorization, is \$50.

BY-LAW 23: PROFESSIONAL CORPORATIONS

[Approved by Council March 2003, amended December 2007]

This by-law is made under the authority of the Regulated Health Professions Act, 1991 as amended 1993, 1996 and 1998, subsections 94(1) (d.1), (d.2) and (d.3) and the Psychology Act, 1991 as amended. 1998

- 1. (1) The fee for the application for, and issuance of, a certificate of authorization, including any reinstatement of a certificate of authorization, for a professional corporation is \$500.
- (2) The fee for the annual renewal of a certificate of authorization is \$350.
- (3) A professional corporation or a member listed in the College's records as a shareholder of a professional corporation shall pay an administrative fee of \$50 for each notice sent by the Registrar to the corporation or member for failure of the corporation to renew its certificate of authorization on time. The fee is due within 30 days of the notice being sent.
- (4) The fee for the issuing of a document or certificate respecting a

professional corporation, other than the first certificate of authorization or the annual renewal of a certificate of authorization, is \$50.

- 23.1 Every member of the College shall, for every professional corporation of which the member is a shareholder, submit the appropriate fee and provide, in writing, the following information on the application and annual renewal forms for a certificate of authorization, upon the written request of the Registrar within 30 days and upon any change in the information within 30 days of the change:
 - (a) the name of the professional corporation as registered with the Ministry of Consumer and Business Services;
 - (b) any business names used by the professional corporation;
 - (c) the name, as set out in the register, and registration number of each shareholder of the professional corporation;
 - (d) the name, as set out in the register, and registration number of each officer and director of the professional corporation, and the title or office held by each officer and director;
 - (e) the principal practice or head office address, telephone number, facsimile number and email address of the professional corporation;
 - (f) the address and telephone number of all other locations, other than residences of clients, at which the professional services offered by the professional corporation are provided; and,
 - (g) a brief description of the professional activities carried out by the professional corporation.
- 23.2 The information specified in subsection (5) is designated as public for the purposes of paragraph 4 of subsection 23(3) of the *Health Professions Procedural Code*.

BY-LAW 25: THE REGISTER AND RELATED MATTERS

By-Law 25: The Register and Related Matters lists information the College collects and maintains on members. Please note that only a subset of this is available to the public. Section 25.5 lists the information that is **NOT** publicly available. Specifically, this includes:

- 25.3.2 the member's registration number
- 25.3.3 the member's gender and date of birth
- 25.3.11 the member's home address and home telephone number
- 25.3.12 the member's preferred mailing address for communication by the College
- 25.3.13 the member's preferred e-mail address for communication by the College
- 25.3.17 if the question of the member's capacity has been referred to the Fitness to Practice Committee and not yet decided, a notation of that fact
- 25.3.20 if the member has been required to attend before the Complaints Committee to be cautioned, a notation of that fact
- 25.3.21 If a finding of professional misconduct, incompetence or incapacity has been made against a member by any other regulatory body, in or outside of Ontario, or in any other health profession,
 - (a) a notation of that fact,
 - (b) the date of the finding and the name of the governing body that made the finding,
 - (c) a brief summary of the facts on which the finding was based,
 - (d) the penalty, if any, and
 - (e) where the finding is under appeal, a notation of that fact, which notation shall be removed once the appeal is finally disposed of;

BY-LAW 25: THE REGISTER AND RELATED MATTERS

[Approved by Council December 2003; amended March 2007]

This by-law is made under the authority of the Regulated Health Professions Act, 1991 as amended 1993, 1996 and 1998, subsections 94(1) (d.1), (d.2) and (d.3) and the Psychology Act, 1991 as amended. 1998

- 25.1 (1) A member's name in the register shall be the member's name as provided in the documentary evidence used to support the member's initial registration. and shall be consistent with the name used by the member on his or her diploma or degree in psychology.
 - (2) The Registrar shall direct that a name other than as provided in subsection (1) be entered in the register if such a request is made by the member and the Registrar is satisfied that the member has validly changed his or her name and that the use of the name is not for an improper purpose.
- 25.2 (1) Unless otherwise approved by the Registrar, a member's business address in the register shall be the address of the location in Ontario where the public may contact the member. member principally engages in psychological practice or, if the member does not practise in Ontario, the member's address, as designated by the member.
 - (2) A member's business telephone number in the register shall be the telephone number of the location in Ontario where the member principally engages in psychological practice or, if the member does not practise in Ontario, the telephone number of the location designated in subsection (1).
- 25.3 In addition to the information required under subsection 23(2) of the Health Professions Procedural Code of the Regulated Health Professions Act, 1991, the register of the College shall contain the following information with respect to each member:
 - 1. The member's name and any changes to the member's name which have been made in the register since he or she first became registered with the College;
 - 2. The member's registration number;
 - 3. The member's gender and date of birth;
 - 4. The date when the member's certificate of registration was first issued by the College;
 - 5. If the person ceased to be a member as a result of his or her resignation or death, the date upon which the person ceased to be a member;
 - 6. The highest degree in psychology held by the member and on which registration is based;
 - 7. The name of the educational institution from which the member received his or her highest degree in psychology upon which registration was based, and the year in which the degree was obtained;
 - 8. The classes of certificates of registration held by the member, the date on which each was issued and, if applicable, the termination or expiration date of each;
 - 9. The member's <u>authorized</u> Area(s) of Practice and Client Groups served;

- 10. The address and telephone number of the each location in Ontario where the member principally engages in psychological practice;
- 11. The member's home address and home telephone number;
- 12. The member's preferred mailing address for communication by the College;
- 13. The member's preferred e-mail address for communication by the College;
- 14. An optional e-mail address for use by the public;
- 15. If the member is a shareholder, officer or director of a health profession corporation which holds a certificate of authorization issued by the College, the name of the health profession corporation and what position or title, if any, the member holds with that corporation;
- 13. Any term, condition or limitation on the member's certificate of registration;
- 14. The results of any disciplinary or incapacity proceeding in which a member's certificate of registration was revoked and the date of the revocation;
- 15. If the member's certificate of registration is subject to an interim order of the Executive Committee, a notation of that fact, the nature of that order and its effective date:
- 16. If the member's certificate of registration is suspended for non-payment of the annual fee or any fee required by the College, a notation of that fact and the date upon which the suspension took effect;
- 17. If the member's certificate of registration is suspended for failure to comply with the order of a Board of Inquiry, a notation of that fact and the date upon which the suspension took effect;
- 18-16. If an allegation of professional misconduct or incompetence has been referred to the Discipline Committee in respect of the member and is outstanding,
 - (a) a notation of that fact and whether the allegations are for professional misconduct or incompetence,
 - (b) a brief summary of each specified allegation, and
 - (c) the date of the hearing if the hearing date has been set or the next scheduled date for the continuation of the hearing if the hearing has commenced;
- 19-17. If the question of the member's capacity has been referred to the Fitness to Practice Committee and not yet decided, a notation of that fact;
- 20-18. If the person ceased to be a member as a result of his or her resignation after a referral to the Discipline Committee, a brief summary of the allegations against the member, and the fact that the resignation occurred in the face of such allegations, or such other notations as may be agreed to by the member and the Registrar;
- 21 19. If, prior to January 1, 1994, the person ceased to be a member as a result of his or her resignation after a referral to Discipline, a brief summary of the allegations against the member, and the fact that the resignation occurred in the face of such allegations, or such other notations as may be agreed to by the member and the Registrar;
- 22-20. If the member has been required to attend before the Complaints Committee to be cautioned, a notation of that fact;
- 23-21. If a finding of professional misconduct, incompetence or incapacity has been made against a member by any other regulatory body, in or outside of Ontario, or in any other health profession,
 - (a) a notation of that fact,
 - (b) the date of the finding and the name of the governing body that made the finding,
 - (c) a brief summary of the facts on which the finding was based,

- (d) the penalty, if any, and

- 24. If a decision of the Discipline Committee has been published by the College with the member's name included,
 - (a) a notation of that fact, and
 - (b) identification of the specific publication of the College containing that information.
- 25 22. In the case of a member holding a Certificate of Registration Authorizing Supervised Practice, the names of the member's supervisors;
- 26 23. In the event of a member's incapacity or death, The name(s) and contact information of the individual(s) who will have custody of the member's client records in the event of a member's incapacity or death. This information will only be made available to the public in the actual event of a member's incapacity or death.
- 25.4 Notwithstanding the provisions of section 3, the College shall delete from the register any information that would otherwise have been required to be maintained under this by law in respect of any member who died which is no longer needed in order to protect the public.
- 25.5.25.4 In addition to the information under subsection 23(2) of the Health Professions Procedural Code of the Regulated Health Professions Act, 1991, the register shall contain, in respect of each health profession corporation to which a certificate of authorization has been issued by the College, the following information:
 - 1. The certificate of authorization number;
 - 2. The head office and mailing address of the health profession corporation if different from the member's business address;
 - 3. The date upon which the certificate of authorization was first issued;
 - 4. If the certificate of authorization has been revoked, a notation of the fact, the date when the revocation occurred and a brief summary of the reasons for the revocation;
 - 5. If the certificate of authorization was revised or a new certificate of authorization was issued to the health profession corporation, a notation of that fact and the date when that occurred;
 - 6. The name, as set out in the College register, of each of the officer and director of the health profession corporation and the title or office held by each;
 - 7. The practice name(s) or business name(s), if any, used by the health profession corporation;
 - 8. The address and telephone number of each location at which the health profession corporation carries on business;
 - 9. A brief description of the business activities carried on by the health profession corporation.
- 25.65 Subject to section 25.2 and 4.125.5.1, all information contained in section 25.3, excluding information in paragraphs 2, 3, 11, 12, 13, 17, 20, 2122, 23; and all information in section 3.225.4 shall be information available to the public from the register of the College under subsection 23(5) of the Health Professions Procedural Code of the Regulated Health Professions Act, 1991.

- (c) In the case of a member holding a Certificate of Registration Authorizing Supervised Practice, information respecting Area(s) of Practice and Client Populations Served will not be made available to the public.
- 25.65.(1) At the discretion of the Registrar, a member's previous name or names shall not be information available to the public from the register of the College under paragraph 4 of subsection 23(5) of the Health Professions Procedural Code of the Regulated Health Professions Act, 1991.
- 25.65.(2) Information which, but for the commencement of an appeal or other legal proceeding, would have been available to the public from the register of the College of subsection 23(5) of the Health Professions Procedural Code of the Regulated Health Professions Act, 1991, shall be available to the public from the register of the College as if no appeal or legal proceeding had been commenced.
- 25.76 (1) A member shall immediately provide to the College, if requested to do so by the Registrar upon request, the following:
 - (a) his or her home address and home telephone number;
 - (b) The address and telephone number of,
 - i. the location in Ontario where the member principally engages in psychological practice, and
 - ii. all other locations, whether inside or outside of Ontario, at which the member engages in psychological practice;
 - (c) the member's business address and business telephone number,
 - (d) the member's preferred address for communication by the College;
 - (e) a description of the services which the member provides in each of his or her practice locations.
 - (a) information described in sections 25.3 and 25.4, and
 - (b) any other information which the College may be required to collect at the request of the Minister, for the purpose of health human resources planning as per section 36.1 of the Health Professions procedural Code of the Regulated Health Professions Act, 1991.
 - (2) A member shall notify the Registrar within thirty (30) days of a change in his/her name. If there has been any change in any of the other information which is required to be provided under subsection (1) the member shall notify the Registrar in writing of the change within thirty (30) days of the effective date of the change.

The Federation Of Health Regulatory Colleges Of Ontario (FHRCO) Announces Public Education Campaign

We Care About Your Care: New Education Campaign Brings Important Health Care Message to the Public.

The Federation of Health Regulatory Colleges of Ontario (FHRCO) is about to launch its third Public Education Program. Set to be officially launched to the media in January 2009, this campaign centres on the slogan *We Care About Your Care*. It is designed to help consumers make educated decisions about their health care and increase their awareness about the value of regulation and the role of health colleges.

The campaign is aimed at directing the public to individual regulatory colleges to find answers to their questions about regulated health professions. It will be delivered through a series of short news stories that will be distributed to newspapers across Ontario, the FHRCO website, and newspaper ads. Each month, newspaper outlets across Ontario will receive a news story on one aspect of health care that is overseen by regulatory colleges. The stories, available in either English or French, are written in easy-to-understand language with examples and scenarios that are meaningful to consumers.

Woven into each article is a simple message about regulated health professions and their colleges. Readers are directed to the new FHRCO website where they will learn more about the regulated colleges and how to contact individual colleges.

Topics for the upcoming campaign include:

- Are You Making Informed Health Care Decisions? Many consumers don't understand treatments
- Who Owns Your Medical Records? Patients have a right to access records and ensure accuracy

Allied Health Human Resources Database (AHHRDB) Project

HealthForceOntario is the province's strategy to ensure that the people of Ontario have access to the right number and mix of qualified healthcare providers, now and in the future. Evidence-based health human resources planning is essential to achieve this goal.

The Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care and the allied health regulatory College are working together in a collaborative and transparent manner, to build the Allied Health Human Resources Database to support evidence-based health and human resources planning in Ontario.

In March 2008, the Ministry launched the long-term strategy for the Allied Health Human Resources Database project with all of the allied health regulatory Colleges. The AHHRDB will complete its first partial data collection in June 2009 and expects to complete its first full data collection in 2010.

The Regulated Health Professions Act, 1991 authorizes the Ministry to request that Colleges collect and disclose membership information for the purpose of health human resources planning. During the upcoming membership renewal process, the college will be collecting information required by the Ministry to be used, in a non-identifiable manner, for health human resources planning.

Elections: District 5 - GTA East District 6 - GTA West

Psychological Associate: ex-officio

Date: A date of **Friday, March 31, 2009** has been set for the elections to Council.

Elections will be held for Electoral Districts 5 (GTA East), 6 (GTA West) and the Psychological Associate ex-officio seat.

District 5 – GTA East This district is composed of the addresses within the Municipality of Toronto that have postal codes beginning with M1, M2, M3, and M4, and the municipalities of Vaughan, Richmond Hill, Markham, Pickering, Ajax, Whitby and Oshawa.

District 6 – GTA West This district is composed of addresses within the Municipality of Toronto, which have postal, codes beginning with M5, M6, M7, M8, and M9 and the municipalities of Mississauga and Brampton.

Psychological Associate: ex-officio

Eligibility: A psychologist or psychological associate must be engaged in the practice of psychology in the electoral district for which he or she is nominated, or, if the member is not engaged in the practice of psychology, is resident in the electoral district for which he or she is nominated.

> Psychological Associates who have previously chosen to vote for the Psychological Associate seat in District 7 are not eligible to nominate and vote in Districts 5 and 6.

NOTE: All Psychological Associates are eligible to nominate and vote for the Psychological Associate exofficio seat.

A psychologist or psychological associate must not be in default of payment of any fees; the certificate of registration must not have been revoked or suspended in the six years preceding the date of election or subject to a term, condition or limitation, as a result of a disciplinary action, within two years leading up to election.

- **Nominations:** A nomination form is included with this <u>Bulletin</u>. A psychologist or psychological associate may be a candidate for election in only one electoral district in which he or she is an eligible voter. A nomination for electoral districts 5 and 6 must be signed by at least five members (psychologists or psychological associates) who support the nomination and are eligible to vote in that electoral district. The nomination form for the psychological associate exofficio seat, must be signed by three psychological associates who support the nomination.
- **Deadline for nominations:** Initial nominations are due by 5 p.m., Friday, January 30, 2009. Further nominations will be received until 30 days before the election. Monday, March 2, 2009 is the last day for receiving nominations for the election. Those needing additional nomination forms may download it from the College web site, photocopy them or contact the College office.
- Withdrawal of nomination: A candidate may withdraw his or her nomination by giving notice to the Registrar in writing, not less than 30 days before the election. The last day for withdrawal is Monday, March 2, 2009.

Procedures

- **Distribution of ballots:** No later than 15 days before the election, a final list of candidates in the electoral district, a ballot, the candidates' biographies and statements and an explanation of the voting procedures will be sent out.
- **Voting procedures:** Each member eligible to vote in a given district will receive a pre-addressed envelope in which to seal the completed ballot. The name and address of the voting member must be recorded in the appropriate space on the outside of the envelope so that the scrutineers may verify the voter's name and address against the voters' list. The envelope containing the ballot with your vote must be postmarked no later than Tuesday, March 31, 2009.

The College will distribute the ballots to members in each electoral district, receive the sealed envelopes containing the completed ballots, confirm the voters against the voters' list, count and record the votes, and report the results of the election to the Registrar. The voting will be confidential and the College will arrange for a neutral third party to oversee

the counting of ballots. Candidates may, at their own expense, choose to send a representative to observe the counting process.

Other Information

Responsibilities: Council members are appointed to the seven statutory committees (Executive, Registration, Complaints, Discipline, Fitness to Practise, Quality Assurance, and Client Relations) and can expect to serve on at least two such committees. Council members can become members of other standing committees, as well as various ad hoc committees established.

Term of Office: The term of office for elected members is three years. During that time a member may be appointed to chair one or more committees.

Time Commitment: Council meetings are held at least quarterly and normally last

Members in the electoral districts will receive candidate statements and biographies with their ballots.

Ballots are mailed to voters no later than 15 days before the election.

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one full day (usually a Friday). Committees may meet the day before the Council meeting or between Council meetings. Committees are likely to meet twice as often as the Council for at least one full day.

The first Council meeting of the new term will take place on June 19, 2009. Further meetings for the 2009-2010 year have not yet been scheduled. At the end of the first day of the June Council meeting, the Executive Committee will meet to appoint new Council members to Committees.

Per diems and Expenses: Current Council policy provides for a per diem of \$295 for Council and committee meetings. Half-day meetings are pro-rated.

Expenses covered include necessary travel (economy fare or mileage); hotel; meals; and necessary taxi fare or parking expenses. If a meal, such as lunch, is provided during a full day meeting, then the amount allocated for lunch is deducted from available expense coverage.

Discipline Proceedings

The Discipline Committee of the College holds hearings into allegations of professional misconduct and/or incompetence. A summary of disciplinary proceedings is provided for the information of the public, members of the College and other professionals.

John Johnston, Ph.D., C.Psych.

A hearing was held on June 18, 2008, into allegations of professional misconduct against Dr. Johnston arising from a complaint and from a Registrar's Investigation.

Established Facts:

The following is a summary of the conduct acknowledged by Dr. Johnston:

• submitting an account and providing invoices and receipts in respect of individuals who did not see Dr. Johnston or receive any psychological services from him; although these individuals were the siblings of a child client assessed

by Dr. Johnston, there was no need for these other children to be involved in the assessment other than their inclusion in a family history taken from the parents;

- engaging in a conflict of interest in that he performed work relating to his private practice during the hours of his
 employment by a school board and seeing clients in his private practice that he knew or should have known were
 students of that school board;
- signing a report that he knew or ought to have known was false, misleading or otherwise improper; and
- failing to maintain clinical records in a manner that adhered to the standards of the profession

Decision:

Based upon a Statement of Agreed Facts, the Panel found that Dr. Johnston had committed Professional Misconduct.

Penalty:

The panel accepted the joint submission of Dr. Johnston and the College and ordered that Dr. Johnston:

- complete a formal course or program in professional ethics;
- undergo a one year period of peer mentorship with a focus on professional ethics and practice management;
- receive a recorded reprimand;
- receive a suspension of his certificate of registration for a period of one year commencing on August 1, 2008; on
 August 31, 2008 the remaining 11 months to be suspended for a period of one year and if, following the period of
 one year, the peer mentor reports to the Registrar that Dr. Johnston has satisfactorily completed the mentorship, and
 the other requirements of this order have been satisfied, the remaining 11 month period of suspension shall be
 stayed; and
- pay the costs of the College in respect of this matter within 60 days of entering his plea of guilt, fixed and agreed at \$10.000

Panel's Reasons:

- The Panel determined that the jointly agreed recommended penalty was appropriate in light of Dr. Johnston's cooperation with the College, his guilty plea and his willingness to rehabilitate his practice;
- The disposition will protect the public from the risk that Dr. Johnston will reoffend; and
- The peer mentorship process offers an opportunity for Dr. Johnston to make many improvements to his practice

Dr. Michael Gadon

A hearing was held by a panel of the Discipline Committee of the College of Psychologists of Ontario on October 7, 2008 into allegations of Professional Misconduct against Dr. Gadon.

Established Facts:

The following is a summary of the conduct which was described in a Statement of Agreed Facts:

In the context of treating a client whom he diagnosed with adjustment disorder, pain disorder and a substance dependency, and who reported psychological vulnerability predating the work injury which precipitated the referral for psychological treatment, Dr. Gadon had sexual intercourse with the client during a session at his private office and subsequently had sexual encounters with her during regularly scheduled counseling sessions. Dr. Gadon also made inappropriate statements, including ill-advised attempts at humour with sexual overtones and gave the client \$2000 twice, for a total of \$4000.

Decision:

Based upon the Statement of Agreed Facts, the Panel found that Dr. Gadon had:

- Committed professional misconduct through engagement in a sexual relationship with a client;
- Practiced the profession while in a conflict of interest;
- Engaged in conduct which would reasonably be regarded as disgraceful, dishonourable or unprofessional; and
- Failed to maintain the Standards of the Profession

Penalty:

The panel administered a reprimand to Dr. Gadon and directed that his Certificate of Registration be revoked.

Panel's Reasons:

The panel agreed with the joint submission on penalty, which was prescribed by statute.

INFORMATION TO MEMBERS

The following notice was published in the *Hamilton Spectator* on Saturday, November 29, 2008 and in the *Burlington Post* on December 3, 2008. The College had taken the matter of the named individual's use of the protected titles and terms to the Ontario Superior Court of Justice and received the declaration as noted.

NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC FROM THE COLLEGE OF PSYCHOLOGISTS OF ONTARIO REGARDING STEPHEN HAMBLY, PH.D.

On November 21, 2008, the Ontario Superior Court of Justice issued Declarations that Stephen Hambly, who is not a member of the College of Psychologists and is not authorized to practice psychology in Ontario, had breached:

- the prohibition in s. 33(1) of the Regulated Health Professions Act ("RHPA") in that, not being a member of any of
 the entities listed in s. 33(2) of the RHPA, he has used the title "doctor", or a variation or abbreviation thereof, in
 the course of providing or offering to provide, in Ontario, health care to individuals;
- s. 8(1) of the Psychology Act, 1991, S.O. 1991, c. 38 (the "Act") in that, without being a member of the College of Psychologists of Ontario ("CPO"), he has used the title "psychologist", and/or a variation or abbreviation thereof;
- 3. s. 8(2) of the Act in that, without being a member of the CPO, he has held himself out as a person who is qualified to practice in Ontario as a psychologist or in a specialty of psychology;
- ss. 8(2) and (3) of the Act in that, without being a member of the CPO, he has used the word "psychology" in a title
 or designation or in a description of services offered or provided in a context other than that described in s. 8(4)
 of the Act; and
- 5. ss. 27(1) and (2) of the RHPA in that he performed, without legal authority, a controlled act, specifically the act of communicating to an individual or his personal representative a diagnosis identifying a disease or disorder as the cause of symptoms of the individual in circumstances in which it was reasonably foreseeable that the individual or his personal representative would rely on the diagnosis;

The Court also Ordered that Stephen Hambly shall forthwith refrain from and cease and desist:

- 1. using the title "doctor", or any variation or abbreviation thereof, or any equivalent in another language thereof, in the course of providing or offering to provide, in Ontario, health care to individuals;
- 2. using, by any medium whatsoever, the title "psychologist" or "psychological associate", any variation or abbreviation thereof, or any equivalent in another language thereof:
- 3. holding himself out as a person who is qualified to practice in Ontario as a psychologist or psychological associate or in a specialty of psychology;
- 4. using, by any medium whatsoever, the word "psychology" or "psychological", or any abbreviation thereof, or any equivalent thereof in another language, in any title or designation or in any description of services offered or provided, except in the course of his employment by a university; and
- 5. performing controlled acts under the RHPA, including communicating to an individual or his personal representative a diagnosis identifying a disease or disorder as the cause of symptoms of the individual in circumstances in which it was reasonably foreseeable that the individual or his personal representative would rely on the diagnosis, save and except as is authorized by s. 29(2) of the RHPA.
