Jennifer stood out, particularly due to her experience with the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario, which demonstrated the valuable skills she brings to our Senior Leadership Team.

Our College has been fortunate to maintain strong leadership retention. Zimra is only the fourth Deputy Registrar since Dr. Catherine Yarrow first assumed the role in December 1991. This continuity allows us to respond to challenges with the judgment and perspective that come from experience.



I dedicate this edition of the Registrar's message to Barry Gang, who recently retired as Deputy Registrar and Director of Professional Affairs at the end of December 2024. Prior to Barry joining the College's senior leadership team, he was already an accomplished clinician and healthcare leader. Despite his success in the field, he chose to embark on a journey that is far less travelled, to work for the College. Barry dedicated a quarter of a century of his life to serving the public interest through ethical and dignified regulation. Barry's 25-year career with the College started as the Director of Investigations and Hearings in March 2000. Barry went on to earn his MBA from the Schulich School of Business in 2010, and became the Deputy Registrar & Director, Professional Affairs in December 2015.

Barry's legacy at the College will live on through his solid work and through the lives he has touched. There are too many accomplishments to list, but most recently, Barry's leadership on the 2024 revision to the Standards of Professional Conduct and on the completion of the Ministry of Health's College Performance Measurement Framework are two significant highlights. Barry will also be remembered as an operational leader of several College departments, with most recently, the Quality Assurance and Client Relations Committees. Many of you, however, would have come to know Barry through his leadership of the Practice Advice Service, and his reflective and ethical approach to managing professional issues.

When I joined the College as Registrar in early 2023, Barry welcomed me with kindness, professionalism, and loyalty. I personally owe Barry a debt of gratitude for his support; whether it be his listening ear or him taking on another project, Barry has been an exceptional teammate and confidant.

The consensus is that there are so many wonderful things to say about Barry, and working with him, but he is quoted by his senior leader colleagues as "...above all else, an incredibly kind and thoughtful person. He is a wonderful role model to staff in his commitment to excellence in his work." This is how Barry and his illustrious career will be remembered.

Barry's legacy will also be reflected in the College's incoming Deputy Registrar, Zimra Yetnikoff. A graduate of the University of Toronto's Faculty of Law, Zimra obtained her Juris Doctor in 2006 prior to being called to the Ontario Bar in 2007. She first joined the College in 2009 as a case manager under Barry's tutelage and was then subsequently promoted to Director of the portfolio in 2016 upon Barry's promotion to Deputy Registrar and Director of Professional Affairs. The future of the College is bright!

I end my message with a call to action for the membership. In this era of incivility, dysregulation, and social conflict, let us all learn from Barry. Let us take the opportunity to reflect on our own professional lives and to take stock in whether we are conducting ourselves in alignment with our values and that of our professions. Barry will forever be remembered by his ability to maintain professionalism even when it is most challenging. Perhaps this is how many of us will want our legacies to be remembered as well.

Purging filing cabinets, shredding outdated memos, and trying to put things in order for my successor have propelled me down memory lane. I began a usually interesting, and mostly rewarding career as a mental health professional almost 40 years ago. CBT was gaining in popularity and was being seen by some as a panacea. SSRIs were just receiving government approval. We were also coming to grips with the unintended consequences of deinstitutionalization policies. As an obedient supervisee, I adhered to what my supervisors said were best practices.

In the workplace, I would soon get access to a shared desktop computer with a glowing green screen, and a CPU (central processing unit) as high as my desk with a slot for floppy discs. Mobile phones were available but impractical because they were the size of bricks. I don't believe social media and cancel culture were even on the radar. Most of us were unaware of any divisive identity politics in the professional world.

What seemed important then was listening carefully with the third ear, making clinical formulations based on sound theoretical foundations, and applying the right techniques within professional relationships that were based on trust and authenticity.

Fast forward, after about 20 years, I took a position at the College, where I am reminded every day that good

helpers are still trying to help alleviate suffering but are now doing that in an environment of virtual services, cloud technology, artificial intelligence, and other technical 'advances'. They must also navigate everchanging legislation and deal with what seems like an unprecedented lack of public and professional civility.

So, what does competent care mean now and what makes for the kind of practitioner you would consider sending someone you care about to?

The College often uses the language of 'knowledge, skill and judgment as the ingredients of competence. Intuitively, knowledge and skill are relatively simpler to address and typically reflect what we get from graduate school, high quality supervision and robust continuing professional development. Optimizing professional judgment is not as easy to chart. Not surprisingly, my own strong anecdotal observation at the College is that most of the difficulties registrants encounter are more closely related to judgment, than to knowledge or skill.

The American Psychological Association (APA) Dictionary of Psychology (2024) defines judgment as the capacity to recognize relationships, draw conclusions from evidence, and make critical evaluations of events and people.

Some good ideas about enhancing the quality of one's judgment can be borrowed from the business world. Sir Andrew Likierman, professor of management practice at London Business School (cited in Aon website 2020) defines judgment in simple terms as "the ability to combine personal qualities with "relevant knowledge and experience to form opinions and take decisions." He provides the following suggestions for enhancing judgment:

- Being aware of our own "information filters,"
 questioning whether the information fits with our
 experience, and seeking additional or better sources,
 where necessary
- Attending to the quality of the information and the value of seeking a diversity of opinions and information, rather than looking for an "echo chamber, all while considering the credibility of information sources.
- Thinking about what went right and wrong with past decisions, particularly those made in stressful times
- Understanding one's own biases and seeking the input of an objective third party where necessary.
- Not accepting what seems at first to be the obvious option
- Understanding that a decision itself isn't the final step, but implementation is also critical to finding success.

Likierman cites economist John Maynard Keynes who said 'When facts change, I change my mind. What do you do, sir? Likierman says "Sticking to something regardless of the facts is one of the best-known biases giving rise to poor judgment."

Most registrants can, with relative ease, figure out the path toward enhanced knowledge and skill by thoughtfully

accessing educational and other experiential pathways.

The good judgment to use that knowledge and skill for the

betterment of clients, society and ourselves requires more of an inward journey that is no less important.

REMINDER: CONSULTATION ON PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO COLLEGE BY-LAWS

The College is inviting comments on proposed amendments to the College By-laws.

AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAW 18: FEES

(Interim Autonomous Practice Certificate for Manitoba Registrants via Winnipeg Health Authority)

At the meeting of the Council of the College of Psychologists and Behaviour Analysts held on December 13, 2024, a motion was passed to circulate proposed amendments to By-law 18.4(f) which seeks to waive application fees and annual dues for those psychology professionals working on inter-professional teams of the Winnipeg Health Authority providing publicly-funded telepsychology services to a specific region of Northwestern Ontario (Interim Autonomous Practice certificate under the Interjurisdictional Telepsychology MOU).

According to the Health Professions Procedural Code under the Regulated Health Professions Act, 1991, amendments to this By-law must be circulated to members 60 days before it is approved by Council [94(1)(s), 94(2)]. If

you wish to comment on the following proposal, we would appreciate hearing from you by February 17, 2025.

ELECTION TO COUNCIL 2025

Nominations are now accepted for the Council election being held on Monday, March 31, 2025. The term of the newly elected Council members will begin on June 20, 2025, the first scheduled Council meeting following the election.

Elections will be held for the following district:

Electoral District 1 (North) is composed of the districts of Kenora, Rainy River, Thunder Bay, Cochrane, Algoma, Timiskaming, Manitoulin, Nipissing, and Parry Sound, and theCity of Greater Sudbury.

Electoral District 2 (Southwest) is composed of the counties of Bruce, Grey, Huron, Perth, Wellington, Dufferin, ambton, Middlesex, Oxford, Brant, Essex, Kent, Elgin, Norfolkand Haldimand and the Regional Municipality of Waterloo.

Electoral District 3 (Central) is composed of the District Municipality of Muskoka, and the counties of

Haliburton, Hastings, Lennox and Addington, Frontenac, Simcoe, Northumberland, and Prince Edward, City of Peterborough, City of Kawartha Lakes and the Regional Municipalities of Halton, Hamilton-Wentworth, and Niagara, and the Regional Municipality of Durham (less the Towns of Whitby and Ajax and the Cities of Pickering and Oshawa), the Regional Municipality of York (less the City of Vaughan, and Towns of Richmond Hill and Markham), and the Regional Municipality of Peel (less the Cities of Mississauga and Brampton).

Psychological Associate (Non-Voting) is elected from the constituency of all Psychological Associates. Please note this is a separate seat from District 7 (Psychological Associate) for which an election was held in March 2023.

EQUITY, DIVERSITY, AND INCLUSION (EDI) UPDATE

As the College continues its journey towards excellence in regulatory practices, the commitment to advancing EDI standards remains a core priority. The College also remains committed to a focus on EDI training for CPO staff, Council and committee members as part of our mandate.

QUALITY ASSURANCE (QA) UPDATE



Working within the statutory requirements established for all Health Regulatory Colleges in Ontario; the College views its <u>Quality Assurance Programs</u> as a means of supporting registrants in maintaining their knowledge and skills throughout their careers. While adhering to the rigorous legislative requirements, the components of the College's Quality Assurance Program have been designed to be supportive rather than investigative. Whenever participation in Quality Assurance leads to the identification of the need for remediation; information about this remains confidential as registrant-specific information about Quality Assurance involvement is not publicly available.

QUERIES

During the second quarter of this fiscal year (September 1, 2024- November 30, 2024), the College's Practice Advice Service addressed 386 inquiries. The five most common topics queried during this period, in descending order, were:

- Supervision; most involving supervision of nonregistrants, the difference between supervision and consultation and the supervision of controlled acts
- 2. Mobility; most involving registrants wishing to practice in other jurisdictions
- 3. Records; most regarding successor Health Information Custodians, retention, and destruction of records
- 4. Fees and Billing; setting of fees, prepayment and retainers, and issuing receipts
- Release of and Access to Information; consent, information about children, and client right of access to information

Many of these questions, and answers to them, can be

found on the <u>Professional Practice FAQ page</u> of the College website which includes the following recent additions.

Consultation Agreements When Consulting Within One's Own Team

Q: I am a member of a multidisciplinary staff group that meets regularly to discuss challenging cases. When I provide input to colleagues about patients that I am not directly involved in treating, would this constitute consultation and thereby require consultation agreements with each participant in these meetings?

A: Standard 4.7 of the Standards of Professional Conduct directly addresses this issue. In summary,

If you were not designated to make specific recommendations to others by virtue of your specialized expertise, it would not be considered "consultation".

Rather, it could be simply understood as team discussion or team development.

If, however, a relationship were established with specific individuals or groups, where you have been designated to provide advice or information regarding psychological or

behavioural matters, and there are plans for you to meet with them to provide advice or information more than once, then it would be considered to be formal, ongoing consultation and you would be required to have formal consultation agreements.

If you participate in consultation with the same group regularly, there is no reason you cannot have an agreement that multiple parties can sign onto, if it includes everyone with whom you require an agreement. You could update this agreement whenever someone new joins the team. The consultation agreement is intended to clarify the nature of a consultation relationship, and serves as protection for all participants including you, in that it provides clarification to the individuals involved concerning responsibility for services.

On a practical note, in institutional settings, such as hospitals or clinics, if your employment contract and the consultee's employment contracts address the required terms referred to in the Supervision Standard, this would be considered to constitute a consultation agreement. Otherwise depending on the nature of the consultation services you provide you would require consultation agreements with each individual.

If you are a participant in actual clinical decision-making with respect to the clients, as opposed to being simply a resource for the decision-makers, then you are more than a consultant and have the same obligations as any member of the College providing services to a client, in a way that is analogous to an assessor or file reviewer who does not provide intervention but must comply with all of the Standards with respect to client care, whether you have interacted directly with the client.

Artificial Intelligence

Q: To what extent may I use Artificial Intelligence (AI) tools in my practice, for example in writing assessment reports?

A: Information obtained from computer-generated assessments, reports, or statements must not be substituted for a member's professional opinion.

Members are free to responsibly use technological advances as an adjunct to their professional services, including the use of Artificial Intelligence (AI) to draft or edit reports. However, it is the position of the College that these professional activities must always be actively mediated directly by members who are authorized to provide the services and that members must remain fully accountable for services provided in their names.

To date, there is insufficient scientific evidence to demonstrate the effectiveness and safety of using ChatGPT or other Artificial Intelligence (AI) to assess or treat mental health conditions and the risk to clients may outweigh any potential benefits. Anyone considering the use of AI to assist or augment their services should ensure, as part of the informed consent process that clients understand how technology is being used to assist them, what the risks are of technological error, and what risks there are to their privacy when personal information is being used in an AI context.

Registrants considering the use of AI tools are strongly advised to carefully review Standard 17. 2 of the Standards of Professional Conduct.

COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS - DECEMBER 13, 2024



The College Council met virtually on December 13, 2024. Information provided to members of Council for their review in preparation for their deliberations and decision-making was posted on the homepage of the College website a week in advance of the meeting. Following the meeting, this information was archived and is available on the website in the Council Meeting Materials Reference Library.

POLICY ISSUES

College Policies (Amendments)

Council has approved amendments to the following College policies:

- Policy II 5(ii): Peer Assisted Review: Criteria for Exemption or Deferral Policy to account for the registration of Behaviour Analysts with the College, such that members who have held a Certificate of Registration Authorizing Autonomous Practice for a total of less than two years would be excluded from the Peer Assisted Review selection process.
- Policy II 2(vi): Vulnerable Sector Screening Policy for Behaviour Analysts, expanding the Criminal Background Check and Vulnerable Sector Screen requirements to include psychology registrants.
- Policy II 8(i): Finance and Audit Committee Terms of Reference/Role to include addition of one (1)
 College member in the Committee's composition

Changes in Registration

Council also approved changes to College's registration processes, in alignment with the feedback provided by the Office of the Fairness Commissioner (OFC):

1. Review of entry-to-practice registration examinations, with a focus on modernization and "right-touch"

regulation approach particularly the utility of the Oral Examination in its current form.

- Revision of the Registration Guidelines to remove the maximum number of attempts permitted to pass registration examinations (psychology and applied behaviour analysis).
- Change in administration of the Jurisprudence and Ethics Examination (JEE), transitioning it to a lowstakes format with the plan for it to become an ondemand, learning module and no-fail examination.

BUSINESS ISSUES

Membership Fees

 Cap on Fees for Dual Certificate Holders (Psychology and ABA Registrants)

At its September 27, 2024 meeting, Council passed a motion to circulate amendments to By-law 18: Fees to obtain feedback and comments from members. The proposed amendments to By-law 18: Fees, specifically on Section 18.5.2. ensures that annual membership fees for dual certificate holders, regardless of the class of each certificate, do not exceed \$1,200.

Following closing of the consultation on December 2, 2024, Council reviewed all responses and approve amendments to By-law 18: Fees.

Waived Fees for Interim Autonomous Practice
 Certificate for Manitoba Registrants via Winnipeg
 Health Authority – Consultation On-going

The proposed amendment seeks to waive application fees and annual dues for those psychology professionals working on inter-professional teams of the Winnipeg Health Authority providing publicly funded telepsychology services to a specific region of Northwestern Ontario (Interim Autonomous Practice certificate under the Interjurisdictional Telepsychology MOU).




NEW COMPLAINTS AND REPORTS

There are currently 180 open Complaints and Registrar's Investigations being actively investigated.




ICRC MEETINGS

The ICRC disposed of 21 cases during the 4th Quarter, as follows:




The ICRC took some action, ranging from providing advice to referring the matter to the Discipline Committee, in 12, or 57%, of these cases.
